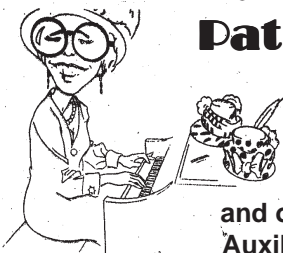

My life journey has brought me home to Sherman, to my family and now to my home at hospice and I am so very grateful and blessed each and every day." Vicky is a Licensed Clinical Social Worker, with independent practitioner status in the state of Texas. She was born in Gainesville, Texas, but resided in Las Vegas, Nevada from 1985-2005, and received her Bachelors Degree in Social Work and her Masters Degree in Clinical Social Work from the University of Nevada, Las Vegas. She relocated to Texas in 2005, and has resided in Sherman since January, 2006. In Las Vegas, Vicky was Administrator for the Center for Compassionate Care at Nathan Adelson Hospice, the only non-profit hospice in southern Nevada. She was responsible for all bereavement services at the hospice as well as for counseling services to hospice patients and their families and free or low-cost counseling to the community. 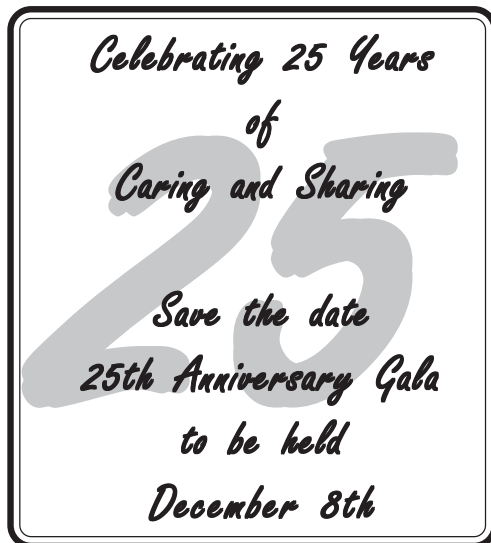
"I'd like to help, but..."

From the Desk of the Director....



With the dawn of 2007, Home Hospice begins our celebration of twenty five years of caring and sharing with the communities we serve. Our staff and volunteers feel privileged to continue to fulfill the mission that was given us by our founders in 1982, "providing care to terminally ill patients and their families regardless of their ability to pay, and to care for all in our community who grieve." Since that initial year, when Home Hospice was housed in a borrowed office at Grayson County College, staffed by one part-time nurse, funded by community donations and the passing of the hat by those original founders and supporters, and caring for three patients, to today, when we are bursting at the seams of our existing office space, staffed by forty-nine full and part-time employees and well over three hundred volunteers in many service categories, and care for almost one hundred patients each day, we have remained committed to that mission and mindful that we belong to the very people we serve. We work every day to earn the trust and respect that has been placed in this organization and to be good stewards of all the resources, including the vision of those whose dream brought about this reality.

Hospice care has traveled a long way since coming first to the United States in 1974, and shortly thereafter to Sherman, Texas, in 1982. The knowledge about end-of-life care and the place and value of hospice has grown. The staff and volunteers of Home Hospice have been instrumental in the growth in the understanding of hospice - did you know that one of our volunteers prepared the newsletter for the Texas Hospice Organization from our office in Sherman during the fledging days of that now large state-wide organization? Home Hospice of Grayson County realizes we have an ethical imperative to provide education regarding options for care during the final phase of life to everyone, both in the medical community and the community-at-large. To that end, we continue to provide programs about issues surrounding this care such as pain control and the final stage of various diseases and diagnoses, nutrition at end-of-life, care of the caregiver, advanced planning for the final phase of life, grief and care of the grieving, the value of life review, and ethics in end-of-life care. Home Hospice of Grayson County is working with the local hospitals on a Palliative Care program, helping to extend knowledge of options for care to many with advanced disease who might not yet be ready for hospice.

The rules and regulations for our medical specialty have expanded dramatically in the last twenty five years. The hospice benefit instituted by Medicare in 1982, still defines hospice, but our original mission defines Home Hospice of Grayson County and enables us to provide care that is so much more. Our care has come to include the professional services of physicians, nurses, social workers, bereavement professionals, chaplains, certified nurses aides and office professionals; along with wonderful services such as meal preparation, limited life review and the preparation of a book of life stories, palliative care services, grief support groups, learning opportunities, aroma therapy, spiritual care opportunities, community education and much more. We are licensed by the State of Texas, certified by Medicare, and accredited by the Community Healthcare Accreditation Program. We are members of many national and state professional hospice organizations. It is a busy world.

During this year, we will take time to honor our past...to provide care and compassion in the present...and to plan for our future. Watch this newsletter for happenings and events held in celebration of this milestone, and THANK YOU to Marty Barr, L. M. Castleberry, Cherry Cunningham, John Dannel, Joan Douglass, Kyra Lucchesi Kerr, John Purcell, Carolyn Sewell, Howard Starr, Don Wilson, Dennis Wilkerson, and countless others who dreamed and then turned that dream into reality.
